Learning about Jesus

As many of you know my mother passed away recently. It has been hard as one might expect it to be losing her. I so very much appreciate the love and support of our community during this difficult time.

Recently it occurred to me that it is no longer possible for me or anyone else to have direct contact with her and know her in the way we were able to before her passing. All we have now are our memories and the stories about her we share. And the truth is that in the future only the stories we pass along about her will remain. Who and how she was will be known only in the stories told by others who will have had no personal contact with her at all.

To complicate the issue for those seeking knowledge of my mother there will be different understandings of her from each of us that knew her. I knew her as a son. My children knew her as their grandmother. Her brothers and sister knew her in an even different way. And then those in her community and her church knew her in even more disparate ways.

This is the truth about the passage of time. It becomes more and more difficult to pin down reality and to accurately characterize people as they recede into the past.

We have that same problem when we seek to ascertain the reality that was Jesus Christ, a man who walked on the earth at the beginning of the first century. Thankfully we have the New Testament to guide us.

Now we must understand a couple things. In all probability almost everything we hear about Jesus in scripture is second hand information. The scriptures are filled with stories that have been passed down from one person to another. The Gospel writers probably didn't know Jesus personally. Did the Apostle Paul know Jesus? Most scholars doubt it. We do know he was acquainted with other Apostles such as Peter and Jesus' brother. So if he didn't know Jesus personally he was only one person away. The rest of the books of the New Testament share this same issue concerning the lack of direct knowledge.

What this means to us is this. We need all the information we can get about Jesus if we want to have an accurate picture of him. We need to study scripture in depth and we need to compare notes with each other. Additionally

we need the help of the Holy Spirit in our quest just as we certainly can use a good prayer life. We can know Jesus Christ intimately but we won't do it with one passage representing one point of view or only a passing interest on our own part.

So it sounds like we need church and Bible study if we want to attain a place of Christian maturity doesn't it? You are right. You just made my point.

The Power of Personal Forgiveness

I got a call this morning from the customer service rep for a small company with whom I placed an order back in July. Since she asked for me by my church-y title and full name I know a couple things: we don't know each other and this is some sort of official call. She tentatively asks if I received an item created by her company that I ordered back in July. I can tell that she is stressed. She's calling to give me some bad news and is steeling herself for an angry response. Naturally she's anticipating such a response based on past experiences which saddens me since I know that most of this company's clientele is made up of female clergy. I tell her. "Yes I did get something other than what I ordered. And it's very nice. I can't wait to see mine." I hear her exhale and her voice relax before she thanks me for being understanding. We figure out the logistics of the return and resend process.

I did nothing worthy of her thanks. We're the church. We do empathy. We forgive, we understand. And if we do them with open hearts of love these things add up to healing. We're followers of a God whose Son spent his short life with people staggering under the weight of heavy burdens and starving for relief from them. They were, as former Presiding Bishop Katherine Jefferts Schori says, "people in need of prodigal love and prodigious forgiveness." And Jesus offered them an endless feast of both. Jesus' companions continued this feast after his ascension. Together they

supported and fed those they encountered. They became the hosts of the banquet. And now it's our turn to do the same for those we encounter.

Jefferts Schori sums it up: "Those who know the deep acceptance and love that come with healing and forgiveness can lose the defensive veneer that wants to shut out other sinners. They discover that hoarding their riches or ignoring the pain of others isn't the way that the beloved act. There's room for all of us at this table; there are tears of welcome and a kiss for the wandered and the sweet smell of home. We are all welcome. Love has saved us."

It turns out that my new friend in customer service and I went to the same college. So in the calls that followed getting the right item to the right place we talked about some of the local watering holes there, the dismal performance of the football team and more. It was a feast.

MORE ABOUT OUR STEPHEN MINISTERS

Our Stephen Ministers have done over 1,000 hours of caregiving ministry during the months (January – August, 2018). The 50 hours of training for Stephen Ministers and an additional 5 days of training for Stephen Leaders have prepared them for ministering to persons who are going through tough times. Some Stephen Ministers have assigned caregivers, and they visit once per week, for 1 hour, in the home, at the park, on the phone, etc. THEY ARE NOT ON 24/7 CALL. Other Stephen Ministers are prayer partners at Sunday services. The past month, they offered prayers with persons at church, on the phone, wherever needed; they have helped the home bound parishioners with errands, appointments and light chores; and, they provided rides for non-drivers to attend activities at the church.

DO YOU KNOW WHO OUR STEPHEN MINISTERS ARE?

St. Matthias' Stephen Ministers pictures are posted, in the hall, on the wall next to the nursery. Also, the history of Stephen Ministry is posted there. "You're invited to talk with them, ask questions, get to know them and allow them to get to know you."

Fortunate 'aratitude aift' for a friend. FRIENDSHIP What you need:

- round object to trace (about 4 inches across)
- lightweight colored paper
- scissors
- ruled notebook paper
- Chinese food takeout box (or small paper gift bag)
- hot glue gun

What you do:

- 1. Trace circles onto the colored paper and cut them out.
- 2. Cut strips of notebook paper and write messages to a friend (or Bible verses about friendship).
- 3. Fold each circle in half without making a crease. Secure the top center edge with glue.
- 4. Pull the outside edges together by creating a bend in the center of the paper. Undo the bend and insert the fortune.
- 5. Re-bend the "cookie" into shape and add glue inside to hold it in place.
- 6. Put all the "cookies" in a takeout box and give to your friend.
